

UC Lied to you zine by autonomous students







As Movimiento Estiduantil Chican@ de Aztlan (M.E.Ch.A) de UCSC, a student run, student led organization that promotes higher education, cultura, and historia, we believe that political involvement and education are the avenue for change in our society. M.E.Ch.A was founded on the principle of self-determination for the liberation of our people, and as such, we are proud of the solidarity between workers and students shown during the Wednesday November twentieth strike. M.E.Ch.A de UCSC has been closely following the struggle of the University of California workers, and many of our members were present at the strike from beginning to end.

We read your position on the recent campus shut-down this morning and this is our reply: Your intentional use of misinformation criminalizes a community that is simply attempting to advocate for itself. These workers are essential to the University, and they had full right to protest against the unfair labor practices to which they have been subjected, but you EVC Galloway, Chancellor Blumenthal and your offices have shown through this campus wide e-mail and through your use of dishonest tactics that you have no intention of understanding the struggle of the workers, or the students who stand in solidarity with them. We are offended by the reckless disregard for truth in the message. You intentionally relayed false information to the campus community for the sake of keeping with an image of the University of California that does not correspond with its actions. While your statement accused the striking workers of blocking off campus entrances, the fact was that the entrances were blocked by independent students, who were demonstrating in SOLIDARITY. Your intentional misinformation of the campus community is a transparent attempt at slandering the workers and delegitimizing their voice. Additionally, while the message clearly implies that the students blocking campus entrances could have potentially been responsible for emergency situations on campus, you failed to mention any of the considerations the students made, including the fact that emergency response vehicles -other than the police- were allowed full access to the campus, as were all medical personnel, students who required medical attention, students who required access to on campus child care, or who live in family student housing, as well as any person who was willing to walk. The omission of this information in your message portrays student organizers in a way that is, once again, obviously meant to sway public opinion away from the side of worker and student organizers

Furthermore, we recognize that ALL workers at the University of California are an essential part of campus functions and community. We recognize the severity with which persistent cuts on resources and inadequate contracts have affected the workers. We recognize the importance of organization, and the urgency with which the strike was NEEDED. We stood in solidarity with the workers on strike, as well as with the STUDENTS who blocked the two entrances to our campus- and will continue to stand in solidarity with worker-student coalitions. Our only hope is that your actions thus far are not indicative of what we can expect from your offices, and that you can progress beyond this toward joining us in standing for honest representation and the fair treatment of University workers and students. La Union Hace La Fuerza!

When UC campus workers went on strike Wed Nov 20, UCSC students struck in solidarity, shutting down campus by blocking vehicle entry.

Below is an explanation and defence of that tactic.

The campus shutdown was a demonstration of where the power lies in the University: students and workers.

Students and workers keep the university running, but we have no formal say in how it runs. A small number of rich and powerful UC Regents, along with highly paid administrators, control the UC's budget and functioning, with no accountability to students and workers. By shutting down campus, we declared our rejection of the Regents' and administrators' authority over the university.







We shut down campus to stop business as usual, to show the direness and urgency of the present situation under austerity, with workers facing pay low enough to require government assistance and so overworked that 1 in 10 workers is injured on the job. Students share this fight against austerity: UC tuition has tripled in 10 years, and there have been more than \$1 billion in cuts to the UC budget over a decade.

The ability to withhold their labor, to strike, is the workers' only response to management's complete control over all other aspects of the work environment and illegal tactics of intimidation. The stakes are enormous. Striking is the only tactic left for workers to fight for their livelihoods and for their humanity.

Blocking cars from entering campus kept management from bringing in scab workers to break the strike. As well as physically stopping cars, the picket line served as a symbol of student-worker solidarity. True, the picket line made it difficult if not impossible for many members of the campus community to access basic resources: attend class, teach, go home, get lunch etc. That is the power of protest to make individuals think twice about the members of our campus community who are not afforded those privileges.









We are Students Informing Now (S.I.N), a student organization at UC Santa Cruz that is dedicated to the advancement of all people, by advocating for just and inclusive policies that promote access into higher education regardless of state assigned immigration status.

We are immigrants, the children of immigrants, and allies who have experienced the exploitation from inhumane and unjust employers. Historically, as people who have been disenfranchised through service work and underpaid jobs, we recognize the worker's struggle. We have also witnessed the long hours and unjust working conditions that workers endure on a daily basis. Furthermore, we recognize the inequality between service workers and administrative staff members in relation to their benefits.

We stand in solidarity with worker-student coalitions. We stand in solidarity with the worker strike because we believe that workers have been treated unfairly. We stand in solidarity with the struggle of service workers across the UC campuses and across the country. We stand in opposition to authoritarian administrations that seek to suppress student-worker movements. As Students Informing Now (S.I.N) we stand with students, workers, and immigrants across the UC campuses!

We Know Strikes Work!

(An incomplete list of our victories for students and workers in recent memory.)

- Fall 2009: After a series of strikes, walk-outs, shutdowns, and building occupations, students forced California Governor Arnold Schwarzenegger to break the 5 year cycle of budget cuts to higher education. In his speech announcing the changes, he specifically cited student protests as the tipping point for the decision.
- March 2010: At a UC Regents meeting following the undergraduate strike and campus shutdown, CA Governor Schwarzenegger was pressured to announce an even more generous \$370 million dollars of restored funding to higher education.
- 2011-2012: Following a statewide series of strikes, shutdowns, walk outs, and building occupations, particularly the undergraduate strike and shutdown of the UCSC campus, students have successfully staved off further tuition hikes by the Regents
- The strikes helped create a sense of crisis that motivated politicians and voters to pass Prop 30, which refunded education by \$6 billion dollars in money that would have been cut from the statewide budget.
- November 2013: When undergrads and workers successfully halted business as usual at UCSC and statewide, it advanced the unions' power in the bargaining room. Already, service workers, graduate students, technical maintenance workers, and even striking engineers at a nearby hospital, who were planning to coordinate with us on campus, have won tremendous gains in their contract negotiations.

Strikes and shutdowns motivate students and workers to halt business as usual, putting incredibly direct pressure on the powers that be — UC administrators, the UC Regents, as well as state and national politicians — to respond to our demands for a safe and democratic university!

These kinds of actions bring different parts of our campus community together, in tandem, in ways that wouldn't be possible with other kinds of protest. In shutting it all down, we build relationships and learn lessons that persist long after the day itself. These build the conditions of possibility for a sustainable opposition to the exploitation of workers, and the privatization of the university.



You may well ask: "Why direct action? Why sit ins, marches and so forth? Isn't negotiation a better path? You are quite right in calling for negotiation. Indeed, this is the very purpose of direct action. Nonviolent direct action seeks to create such a crisis and foster such a tension that a community which has constantly refused to negotiate is forced to confront the issue. It so seeks to dramatize the issue that it can no longer

be ignored ."
