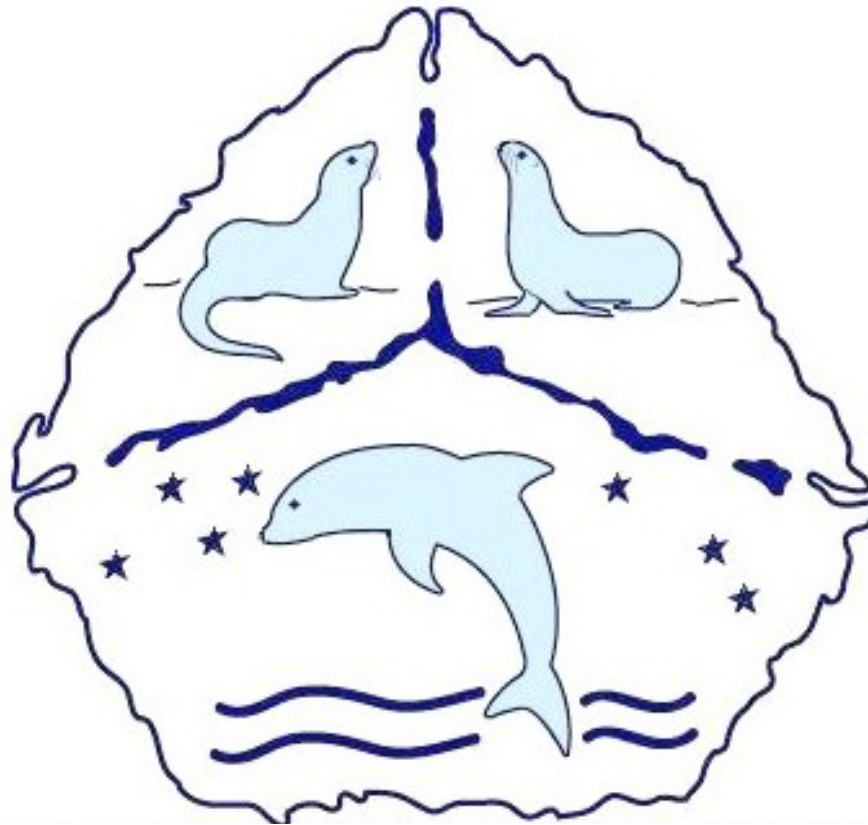

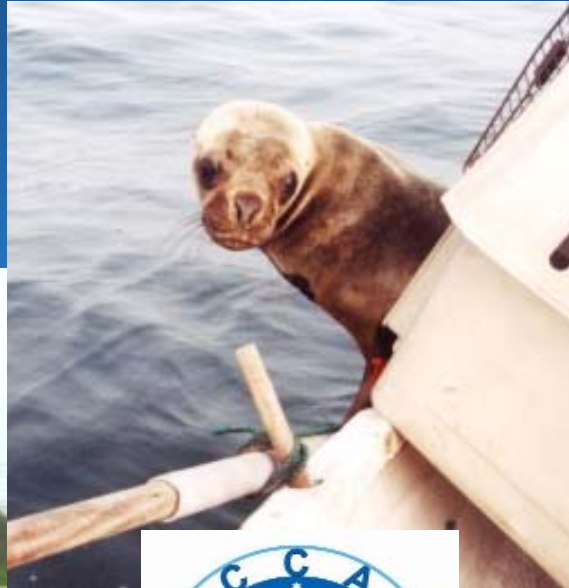

“OSCAR” arrived dehydrated, emaciated, with pneumonia and wounded.

rehabilitated, was released
on June 5th, 2003.**

“NICOLAS”



Before: Dehydration, anorexic, pneumonia and wounds in the flippers, was rescued November 5th, 2003.

After: Totally healed, was released on November 23rd, 2003.

Gender: Male

Age: Juvenile.

Treated for: anorexia, trauma and parasitic infection within an oral wound produced by clubbing (fishermen interaction).



Continued admission of patients: “Gabriela” suffered anemia, dehydration, emaciation, rinitis, neumonía, fever, and ascitis (liquid in the abdomen). She suffered spleen cancer.

Veterinary science is also developed on pollution effects and diseases that could impact both animal and public health.

ORCCAMM is the first South American institution that reports a case of cancer in sea-lions due to pollution.
