Education in Peril at UC

Action Impact

Academic Departments

- Community Studies Program Field Studies staff cut by 75%¹
- Inequitable and arbitrary cuts—particularly in social sciences and humanities²
- Community Studies students no longer able to support local non-profits and social-service agencies across Santa Cruz County
- Range and availability of classes is increasingly limited, making it harder to find classes and to graduate on time

Teaching

- Many lecturing faculty having appointments reduced or being laid off
- Research faculty forced to teach more classes rather than concentrate on research and scholarly publishing

Research

- Cuts to Library—at almost 13%—greater than most other campus departments²
- Freeze on equipment maintenance in Science electronics shop
- Undercuts resources and services crucial to the educational and research mission of the entire University
- Adversely affects research throughout the sciences

Students

- Student fees to rise again—9.3%—7th time in 8 years³
- Since 2002, undergraduate fees will have increased over 117%^{4,5}
- Graduate students' health-care fees to rise 8– 13%⁶
- Since 2002, graduate student fees will have increased over 130%^{4,5}
- Substantial cuts to Student Affairs budget²
- A UC education is becoming the domain of the children of the wealthy
- Many students are saddled with 5-figure debt from the moment they graduate⁷
- Teaching and research assistance—performed by graduate students—jeopardized as graduate study becomes unaffordable
- Students of color—served by Ethnic Resource Centers—disproportionately affected

Employees

- After years of UC-acknowledged pay disparities with comparable California educational institutions⁸, UC engaging in stalling tactics and bad-faith contract bargaining
- Job vacancies often left open or even revoked for 'salary saving'
- Recruitment and retention of quality faculty, academics, and staff is failing
- Workloads become unmanageable as remaining employees take on responsibility for multiple jobs
- Millions spent on the best union-busting law firms in the nation

Budget

UC claims State budget crisis translates to UC budget crisis, yet:

- State provides only 17% of UC budget⁹—and only 4.9% of that is being cut¹⁰
- UC President's annual compensation of \$842,000¹¹ is over twice that of the US President
- Two new UC chancellors being paid salaries
 12% and 27% more than their predecessors¹²

Budget chicanery and a new \$4million publicrelations campaign¹³ give false impression that UC is forced to severely slash its budget, exploit its employees—and fundamentally short-change the education of the highestachieving students in California

UC has nearly \$5.4billion in unrestricted funds at its disposal¹⁴

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
