The books on the real history behind the murder of the Castros in Santa Cruz will be sold as part of a **Lecture Series** and **Mansion Tours** at the Bay View Hotel, a Mexican-Spanish 14-bedroom Hotel. This mansion was a part of the Magnolia Rose Hotel that was built when Capitola was the Capital of Mexico (1833). It was lost in the "land grab" of the San Andres Land Grant and moved from the Capitola Esplanade to Aptos Village, with the last move around 1907 being the year of the main forgery of a fire.

The lectures will deal with the real history of Santa Cruz when it was Mexico, the murder of the Castros, and the dismembering of the Mexican-Mansions and destruction of real history through the systematic forgeries (rapes, disappearances, and murders) by A.F. Heinz aka Reverend Sasowallo, "SheWell" of John William Peyton and John Sloane ("Johann-son") Civil-War "colonizers" who became the famous "Williamson's" who lynched the Governor J. Joe Castro II in 1876. This family would become the Bush, Becketel, Jones, Heath, Huggins, Porter, and Wells ("Shewells") and Brey-fogle families from Santa Cruz forming the Bank name: "Wells-fogle".

Example text:

Mission Santa Cruz and Villa de Branciforte were highly developed port cities in what was North Mexico, developed and governed under a conferation of Spanish-Mexican families, including the Vasquez, Castro, Rodriguez, Leon, Alviso, Peralta, Valenzia, and Pachecos. These families would be the targets of a conspiracy to usurp the land and legacy of the Moors in Mexico. The Mexican Government seat was at Alviso, and after 1833, the Castro governed from Capitola's White House ("Rispin Mansion") and the famous Mexican-Spanish mansion on the Capitola Sea Beach called the "Magnolia Rose". The White House ("Rispin Mansion") was built as early as 1790, and the Magnolia Rose (now dismantled) was built by the Castros as early as 1800 for the Monarchs governing Mexico. The Mexican-Spanish heirs of the *peninsulares* continued to govern into the post-Mexican-American war period in California from 1850 to 1880; and the same Mexican families continued to control the Presidio in San Francisco, Monterey, and Alviso.

The Capitol of North Mexico was at Alviso (1767 to 1831) and moved to Capitola (1833 to 1876) under the Castro Government, which still functioned under the famous Juan Jose "Joe" Castro II and his son that took the older name of "Pedro Alvarado de Anzarin", decedents of Mexican-Spanish land-owners and the real heirs to Mission Santa Cruz. Both were reelected in Mission Santa Cruz, Alta California after it became a member of the U.S. States in 1853. The Mexican-Spanish families were still running the government before their abrupt murders. The political assassinations of the Mexican families still living in Capitola and Mission Monterey after the so-called end to the Mexican-American War happened between 1860 and 1876, with a final string of murders and public lynchings in 1876.

There was a "revision of history" and the local Masonic Lodges and OddFellows Meeting Halls were eventually converted to libraries and filled with the "official" history of Santa Cruz. A.F. Hearne became a main Santa Cruz "founder", a Banker, Minister, Assembly Man, Library Trustee and Real-Estate Baron, who helped forge over Mexican history for the German-American Puritans and pave the way for the reemergence of the First Catholic University in the Americas. A.F. "Hearne" means "Mister" in German. "Hearne" is the origin for the people and place names: Hearne, Hinds, Hihns, Heinz, and "Hearne" is the root word of the place names "Kearne, Kern, Nearny, Leary, Perry and Kearney". Ten consiprators from the OddFellow and Masonic Lodges called "the Bango Boys" would coordinate the "colonialization" of Mission Santa Cruz and the destruction of its Mexican history on April 22, 1876. They would all be children of A.F. Heinz with four different important Mexican-Spanish women.
