FROM RICHMOND TO NIGERIA, residents and activists seek corporate accountability, environmental and climate health.

Nigeria, JANUARY 16, 2012 – Roaring flames leapt above the ocean when a Chevron gas rig exploded off the coast near villages with no access to health facilities. The explosion killed workers and fish, and caused health problems for onshore residents. One month passed before Chevron attempted to put out the raging fire. Although the flames were extinguished on March 2nd, the environmental and health effects continue.

Richmond, AUGUST 6, 2012 – A Chevron refinery fire forced Richmond residents to shelter in place, while a blazing inferno raged — spewing toxic black smoke across the Bay Area. Burning lungs, tight chests, red and smarting eyes, stinging noses, headaches and dizziness were among the panoply of symptoms residents suffered.
