In his February 12 State of the Union address, President Obama singled out Medicare as the primary reason for “the nation’s long-term debt.” He also re-hashed several old, discredited solutions like a jobs bill, a vague infrastructure spending proposal, and education as a first step toward job retraining, but with no dollars attached. None of this speaks to the actual crisis facing the U.S. economy today or offers serious proposals for resolving it. What’s the real story? How do budget cuts affect us? And, most important, how can progressives respond?

Eisenscher’s articles about the labor movement have been published in three anthologies and numerous periodicals. He teaches a course in political economy in the Laney College Labor Studies Program.

He is also a freelance journalist writing widely on U.S. economic and domestic policy topics, and has authored several stage plays focusing on U.S. labor struggles.
