

Stand against INDEFINITE DETENTION

The Day of Remembrance, which takes place each year on or around Feb. 19, commemorates the 1942 signing of Executive Order 9066, setting into motion the exclusion, eviction, and incarceration of 120,000 persons of Japanese ancestry, both citizens and immigrants.

To commemorate the 71st anniversary of this occasion, we call on all advocates of justice to support a

RESOLUTION AGAINST INDEFINITE DETENTION

at the San Francisco Board of Supervisors meeting on **Tuesday, February 26, at 2 pm**, Room 250, San Francisco City Hall, 1 Dr Carlton B Goodlett Place in San Francisco.

The Board of Supervisors has introduced a resolution opposing provisions in the NDAA (National Defense Authorization Act) that could allow the American government to detain anyone—including U.S. citizens— indefinitely, without due process guaranteed under the Constitution.

Indefinite military detention violates the Bill of Rights; specifically, the Fifth and Sixth Amendments, which ensure the right to trial, due process, and more. The NDAA's detention provisions could allow the kind of internment experienced by 120,000 people of Japanese ancestry during World War II, and would give President Obama and future presidents unprecedented power to detain citizens and immigrants without judicial review.

This resolution is sponsored by the San Francisco 99% Coalition (www.sf99percent.org) and the Bill of Rights Defense Committee (BORDC: <http://bordc.org/>), and endorsed by the American Friends Service Committee-US West Region, Asian Law Caucus, Chinese Progressive Alliance, Coalition for a Safe San Francisco, Japanese American Citizens League, Japanese Peruvian Oral History Project, National Lawyers Guild-SF, San Francisco Labor Council, Unitarian Universalists for Peace-San Francisco and UNITE HERE, Local 2 (partial list).

The mission of BORDC (<http://bordc.org/>) is to organize and support an effective, national grassroots movement to restore civil liberties guaranteed by the Bill of Rights.



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The San Francisco 99% Coalition supports the efforts of civil rights and community organizations working to oppose the undermining of constitutional protections under the National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA). We urge the San Francisco Board of Supervisors to pass a resolution raising its voice in

defense of due process and the right to trial. **Please join us!**

The NDAA contains provisions that could allow indefinite and arbitrary military detention, without a trial or day in court, of anyone accused of a “belligerent act” or terror-related offense—including “material support for terrorism” allegations based strictly on speech or association, even by defendants who neither committed nor ever intended to support violence.

Although a federal judge has found this law to be unconstitutional, the Government has appealed and will continue to defend its power to detain any person without trial, and in the meantime the NDAA remains in effect. Since President Obama first signed it into law on New Years’ Eve 2011, without any criticism of its most dangerous provisions, anyone in the United States may now be subject to the same illegal detentions in force at Guantanamo Bay.

Senator Dianne Feinstein proposed a “due process” amendment that would have strengthened the constitutional protections to some extent; although it was passed in the Senate, her amendment was removed from the final version of the NDAA.

While the NDAA may be difficult to change at the federal level, civil liberties advocates must continue to focus public attention on due process by urging local governments to pass resolutions opposing military detention and supporting accused individuals’ right to a trial. Such resolutions have passed in communities across the country.
